Dear Sir. I have been very much interested in reading your account of the experimental station at Roscoff, & of the apparatus used. Further information as to your mode of working is desirable ^{to me}, as I have been engaged for some years past in somewhat similar labors while discharging my duties as U. S. Commissioner of Fish & Fisheries. For the purpose of making a complete survey of the marine fauna & flora of our Coast, I have called to my aid Prof. A. E. Verrill of Yale College, New Haven, whom you doubtless know as an accomplished zoologist, & with the assistance of many professional gentlemen & students, we have been engaged for four successive seasons in our work. The first was, at Woods Hole on the south coast of Massachusetts, the second in the Bay of Fundy, the third near Portland, Maine, & the present at the village of Noank, from which I now write.



We have had the assistance of a Steamer from the U. S. Navy, with suitable hoisting apparatus for the dredge & trawl, ^{and} with a large force of assistants. The result has been the bringing together of large collections, among them many new or rare forms, while the studies in the laboratory have furnished details in reference to the embryological development & general natural history of many animal forms.

The results of our first year's work, have been published by me as a Report of the U. S. Commissioners of Fish & Fisheries, for 1871, in a volume of nearly 800 pages, with many figures. Of this I beg you will accept a copy, by making application for the same to Mr Gustave Bois lange, Bookseller, Paris, & an agent of the Smithonian Institution, if he has any on hand, or to Mr William Wesley, 28, Exeter Street, Strand, London, in accordance with the request of the accompanying letter.

Our collections, as you will readily understand from
the Report, when you receive it are very extensive, & en-
brace all classes of the animal Kingdom. If therefore there
are any specimens from our shores which you desire to obtain

furnish them, indeed, I shall be happy to send to you a
general series of the collections made by my parties, if I can
obtain in return a corresponding series of objects collected
by yourself in the coast of France. This material would be
of much service to Prof. Venill in our identifications & Com-
parisons, & what we can supply on our part, may per-
haps be of equal value to yourself.

Dear Sir: Your letter of the 28th of September was duly received, being forwarded to me from Noank to the Smithsonian Institution in Washington, to which I have returned for the season. I thank you very much for your extremely prompt response to my letter, & for the readiness you exhibit to grant to your fellow-workers in this country the benefit of your own experience. I shall be greatly indebted to you for as complete a set of the portable apparatus for research as you can furnish, & will be glad to wait your convenience for it, as I am in no special hurry. I shall also be pleased to have you add the microscope, with its accessories up to a lens of perhaps not higher than one-fourth. Please furnish me with the address of the maker, so that I may order additional powers if desired.



May I not beg from you the favor of a list of the apparatus that you use for making the collections themselves, so that I may ascertain whether any would be additional to our own standards?

It is my expectation to fit up a first-class working station at
the village of Woods Hole in Massachusetts, which constituted
the scene of the explorations on my part & that of Prof. Verrill
in 1871, to which reference is made in my Report, of which I
trust you have received a copy from Mr. Bophaige. If
improcurable I will forward one from here immediately on
your being so informed. If it is your desire to obtain
marine invertebrates of the American coast it will give us
great pleasure to furnish them; & if there are any par-
ticular species needed immediately for comparison or examina-
tion I beg you will mention them.

On my part, in behalf of the Fish Commission
of the National Museum in the Smithsonian Institution, I shall
be pleased to receive as full a series of the marine invertebrates
of the coast of France as you can lend me, to be, of course, properly
identified as types, for comparison.
If you can give me any idea of the cost of
the equipment referred to I will send the money at once, on Mr.
J. Bophaige will liquidate the account, in my behalf for receiving the
articles. Are there any publications of the Smithsonian In-
stitution or of any bodies in the United States that you desire to ob-
tain? Please ask freely, as it will give me great pleasure to
aid you in procuring them.



Dear Sir:

I was much interested in reading the notice of the enlargement in size and widening of scope of your great seacoast station at Roscoff. Familiar as I am with its plan of inception, I am greatly interested in seeing the account just published in a recent number of *La Nature*.

The station of
the U.S. Fish Commission

at Woods Hole Mass., in
regard to which I believe
I have had some cor-
respondence with you,
is also greatly expanded
in its dimensions and
efficiency, and I will
endeavor to send you
some photographs which
will give you some
idea of its present char-
acter. In addition to
subjects of general biological
research, it has recently
been fitted out for practical
work in the artificial
propagation of the
Sadus morhua and other
sea fishes.

I now write to ask whether you can favor me with any detailed plans and descriptions of the Ross off station, so that I may appreciate it better than I now do after reading the more meagre article in La Nature. I would like to have this as full as possible.

I do not know whether you receive all the biological and other publications of the U.S. Fish Commission. If not, and you will advise me

what you have already,
I will endeavor to com-
plete your list. We are
now publishing, under
the Fish Commission,
and the National Museum,
several thousand pages
annually of biological
matter  somewhat pro-
fusely illustrated. In a
few weeks I expect to
distribute the memoirs
of the Fish Commission
steamer Albatross, with
a full description of all
its complicated apparatus
for deep-sea research.
This, also, is at your

② and containing many memoirs on

service, if you wish it.

Can I not make some arrangement, in return for these publications, to receive the Archives published by you, of which I understand 14 volumes have appeared? I can furnish, I think, a full equivalent, in bulk if not in value, for the same.
