

S. BURDOX SANDERSON, M.A., M.D., LL.D., D.C.L., F.R.S., F.R.S.E., F.R.C.P., Waynflete Professeur de Physiologie à l'Université d'Oxford.

TO BE HELD IN LIVERPOOL, SEPTEMBER 16th to 23rd, 1896.

DEAR SIR,

We have the honour, on behalf of the Executive Committee, to invite you to the next Meeting of the British Association for the Advancement of Science, which will be held in Liverpool, under the Presidency of Sir JOSEPH LISTER, Bart., President of the Royal Society, in the week commencing Wednesday, September 16th, 1896.

The Committee will consider you to be their guest during the time of your stay in this City, and will do all in their power to render your visit a pleasant one.

The objects of the Association may be stated to be:—To give impulse and direction to Scientific inquiry, to promote intercourse between students of Science in the British Empire, and in other countries, to obtain a more general attention to the objects of Science, and to remove any disadvantages of a public kind which impede its progress.

The success of the Association depends greatly on the realisation of the second of these objects—the promotion of personal intercourse between those who are engaged in the pursuit of Science. The advantage of friendly intercourse with fellow workers in other countries is strongly felt by the members of the British Association, and the gain to Science derived from meetings of an international character is acknowledged by all.

The Local Executive Committee of the British Association in this City are desirous of making the presence of Foreign Visitors a prominent feature of the forthcoming meeting, and have reason to hope that their endeavours will be successful. Liverpool has the means of entertaining a large number of Foreign *Savants*, and can offer to them exceptional opportunities of visiting points of interest in the neighbourhood and of becoming acquainted with some of the most important branches of industry in this country. A number of excursions to places of Scientific interest will be arranged—including one, extending over several days, to the Isle of Man.

We shall be grateful to you for an early answer, in order to facilitate the arrangements which have to be made, and we shall be glad to forward to you any information concerning routes, railway communications, etc., that you may desire.
